Notes from the Director

Spring 2004

I was moved by the title and the content of a recent Op-Ed piece in the Hartford Courant entitled “Peace Through Education Not Fences”. The author was referring to the erection in Israel-Palestine of the wall separating the two cultures, in the hopes that this will bring about a peaceful resolution of the ongoing conflict. Robert Frost got it right when he recognized that we love those old and romantic New England stone walls, but “something there is that doesn’t” love them. Why won’t a wall work? Because it denies the essence of each side’s humanity and reinforces the idea that there is only one way to solve a problem-to avoid and deny that communication is possible between warring factions, that reconciliation is an impossible goal.

Parents and teachers will recognize in this syndrome of separation, on a more mundane level, the oft-used solution of pulling apart squabbling children in the hopes that they will cool down and come to some resolution of their conflicts, in effect erecting a metaphoric wall. However we know that resolution of their fight won’t be possible unless 1) the children see some longer-term benefit for themselves in working toward a solution (justice must be served) and 2) the children also possess the skills to do it. A wall of separation won’t work unless it is a step toward a longer term resolution, one that eventually brings the parties together again in reconciliation and relationship, one that empowers the parties in conflict to themselves enter into the final solution, through listening and dialogue. Children and adults must be educated toward learning these skills and recognizing when justice is served.

Why is peace education so important? Because it relies on philosophical principles and processes to teach children and adults that there is a “third way”, not to build walls and avoid, not to fight, but the way of caring, compassion and concern, the way of respect, resolution and relationship building. How many of us have metaphorically been given a hammer and found little else out there but nails? There are great forces at work for peace. All we have to do is look for them.

Here at Pax Educare we continue our work bridging peace education from the local to the global. In this issue you will learn about some of the activities in which we have been involved: locally through the Hartford Youth Violence Prevention Initiative, and speaking engagements and co-sponsoring several events concerned with international issues of peace and justice. You will read of upcoming events in which Pax Educare and others are involved.

We are looking for opportunities to engage in dialogue around the question-“how do we educate toward a culture of peace?” If your community group, religious organization or school is interested, please contact us.

Recent Events:

- The second annual intergenerational Peace Day was held at the Learning Corridor with 100 in attendance. Pax Educare was coordinator for the event. Thanks to all who participated and to the donors of food and funds. It was a great day.
- Mary Lee Morrison presented at the Southern CT State University Women's Studies Conference in October-her workshop presented the life and work of Elise Boulding, subject of her upcoming biography to be published by McFarland Press in 2005. Elise Boulding has been called the "matriarch" of the 20th century peace research movement.
- Pax Educare was featured in an interview on West Hartford Cable, Channel 5, in October, on the program "Songs of the Soul" with Ann Carrol Decker.
- We held a successful Open House and fundraiser November 2 with the Adaskin String Trio, who donated their wonderful talent

- In February we were co-sponsors of the West Hartford Town Hall Forum on Iraq
- Since December, as coordinator of the Hartford Youth Violence Prevention Initiative, we have given out 3 youth mini grants to Hartford based youth groups, with funding from the Governor's Prevention Partnership-see accompanying article
- We have joined the Advisory Board of the CT Safe Schools and Communities Coalition and its sub-committee on Girls and Violence
- We have become members of the CT Coalition for the Advancement of Prevention
- Recently we joined the Academic Council of the United Nations System (www.acuns.wlu.ca)
- We have become an endorsing organization of the Hague Appeal for Peace and their campaign in peace education (www.haguepeace.org)
- We recently had a visit from Chris Low, who helped to found the Women Artists of Matenwa project in Haiti. Pax Educare has been helping to promote the lovely scarves and clothing the women produce as part of their small community cooperative. A new contingent of items is now in stock at the Center. They will be on display at the Magical Strings concert.

Youth Mini-Grants-Pax Educare is the coordinator of the Hartford Youth Violence Prevention Initiative, comprised, in addition to the Center, of Burr School, Watkinson School, Trust House, the Village for Families and Children and the Saint Joseph College Department of Social Work. We recently completed a Strategic Plan and continue to meet monthly. We welcome new members of the coalition. We have awarded \$500 to the following groups, thanks to a grant from the Governor's Prevention Partnership. Each one is youth developed and youth led:

- Batchelder School Conversation Café and Adventure Club, for leadership development through a Ropes course, implementing skills with other classes and the community
- Burr School Student Leadership Team, for training in conflict resolution through the Wheeler Clinic. The trained 7th and 8th graders in turn will then teach 5th graders
- Empowered Youth for Social Change, a Hartford based high school group, for planning and implementation of a forum on human rights

Future goals of the coalition include additional fundraising, expansion of our membership and joint programming around violence prevention, including HIPP (Help Increase the Peace-www.afsc.org/hipp.htm). A HIPP Advanced workshop is scheduled for March 4 and 5.

Here are a few samples of activities and musings, by days (<http://www.jhu.edu/snv/2003/64days.html>) :

- March 9-*Dialogue*. A healthy society is one in which those who disagree can do so with honor and respect for other people's opinions. "Speak your truth quietly and clearly: and listen to others"-Desiderata. Today, speak up but do not enter into the spirit of argument.

- March 10-*Unity*. Today, look for 3 ways to see beyond outer differences in opinions, appearances or goals. Find the meeting point of underlying unity that exists in diversity.
- March 11-*Openness*- "He who builds himself a fence, fences out more than he fences in." (Turkish proverb). Today, be open to understanding and to ideas and people that you have previously opposed.
